**AAAS Statement: EPA “Transparency” Rule Poses Danger to Americans’ Health**

“The Environmental Protection Agency has opened the door for a U.S. government agency to ignore scientific evidence in its decision-making, which we fear will endanger the health of millions of Americans. At a time when the federal government should be focused on responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, the EPA is pushing forward an unnecessary rule that puts our health at greater risk and ignores overwhelming criticism from scientists, doctors, and public health professionals, including its own Scientific Advisory Board. The EPA rule would introduce an untested system for analyzing data and allow the agency to ignore the best available science when setting regulations. Let’s be clear: this rule is a deliberate attempt to exclude scientific evidence from the policymaking process. If this so-called ‘transparency’ rule goes into effect, the EPA’s ability to protect the health of Americans will be diminished.”
